SUMMARY: KNOWLEDGE MOBILIZATION ACTIVITIES

This document provides a list of OTM-linked Knowledge Mobilization (KM) initiatives. It includes KM initiatives arising directly out of On the Move (OTM)-funded work as well as some relevant KM initiatives by team members supported through partly or in full from other grants and activities.

Of the **1,259 KM initiatives** outlined in this document, **249 are trainee initiatives** (presentations, theses, reports, organized sessions, blog posts, interviews, etc.) and **281 include one or more trainee participants** (co-authored presentations/publications, co-organized sessions, etc.). Included in the trainee numbers are five trainees who converted to OTM co-investigators after they secured faculty positions.

1B. INTERVIEWS AND COMPONENT DATA SHARING

Interviews and Surveys

OTM field researchers and a few policy researchers have completed **981 interviews as well as 9 anonymous surveys of diverse groups, and 33 focus groups.** The recordings and notes from this field research are in varying states of coding and analysis. Access to the resulting data and datasets will be governed by the consent process, with some recordings, transcripts and databases ultimately open access, but for most access to original transcripts will be limited to component teams or even, in a few cases, to individual researchers. Component Databases

Policy Component

1. OTM has funded coding and secondary analysis of a dataset from research funded by the federal government, produced by Delphine Nakache and based on data gathered in 2014–2015 from 99 interviewees with participants from three provinces (Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario), including 48 current and 22 former migrant workers (the latter have become PRs), 4 spokespersons from nongovernmental organizations, 12 employers, 11 public servants (federal, provincial, municipal levels), and 2 labor union representatives. (Delphine Nakache and Leonor Cedillo).
2. Online surveys with 36 International Experience Canada (ICE) participants originating from various countries and working in different jurisdictions in Canada. (Delphine Nakache and **Mylène Coderre-Proulx**)
3. Policy component lead (Lippel) completed 26 interviews with individuals and groups related to occupational health and safety, workers compensation and employment standards in 5 provinces across Canada (British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario, Quebec, and Newfoundland and Labrador).
4. **René David-Cooper** completed 5 interviews with professional pilots employed in the Canadian commercial aviation industry related to the effectiveness of Canadian regulations on flight and duty times for professional pilots in Canada
5. 25 interviews were conducted with managers, active seafarers and key informants from government and maritime support organizations between July 2017 and April 2018 for the research project Occupational Health and Safety Management for Mariners on Canadian Vessels on the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River. (**Desai Shan**).

Statistical Component

6. Multiple datasets have been accessed through Statistics Canada including taxfiler and census data on fish harvesters and on Atlantic inter-provincially mobile workers at provincial, regional and community levels. Funding for these datasets has come from On the Move, the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Fund and from the Canadian Council of Professional Fish Harvesters via a contract from the federal government for a study on occupational pluralism among Canadian fish harvesters. Excel tables summarizing the results is included in the OTM folder, Memorial University Research Repository.
7. Economic Region Characteristics: information on various aspects of the population by Economic region. Includes information % of employment, % interprovincial employees, % interprovincial migrants and nearly 40 other elements. Excel spreadsheet summarizing results in Memorial University OTM repository folder.

8. Newfoundland Interprovincial Employee data from the Canadian Employer-Employee Dynamics Database. List of characteristics related to the NL mobile workforce.
9. Fish Harvester and Fish Processor data from the Canadian Employer-Employee Database on mostly income and earnings for fish harvesters and fish processors in Canada, broken down by age, sex, and province for 2000-2017.
10. Atlantic Canadian Interprovincial Employment Trends data for 2003-2010 from the Canadian Employer-Employee Dynamics Database
11. Michael Haan had a postdoctoral researcher, Federico Eichelmann-Lombardo, working with the Temporary Foreign Worker database at Statistics Canada examining patterns of internal mobility within Canada. Haan had a second research assistant, Hyeongsuk Jin, doing an analysis of excess commuting (>200 km) for the construction sector across Canada down to the level of individual trades using Census Data.
 - These databases are now located at Statistics Canada headquarters and Canada Research Data Network Centre.

British Columbia Component

Interview and secondary dataset related to mobility and community capacity in Northern British Columbia. Data collected between 2013 and 2019 by BC field researchers (Greg Halseth, Sean Markey and Laura Ryser):

12. Community Impacts of Long Distance Labour Commuting (Mackenzie and Williams Lake): key informant interviews with businesses, local government, community services, and others (23 in Mackenzie and 25 in Williams Lake).
13. Labour Mobility in Northern BC: 13 interviews with mobile workers engaged in exploration during the exploration phase of the New Gold's Blackwater Project; 42 interviews conducted with mobile workers engaged in construction activities during the construction phase of BC Hydro's Site C project; and 25 interviews were conducted with local workers and 9 interviews were conducted with mobile workers engaged in operations during the Operations phase of the Taseko's Gibraltar mine.
14. Transforming Local Government Strategies for Mobile Workforces: 18 key informant interviews with local government stakeholders in Kitimat, Fort St. John, and the Peace River Regional District.
15. Labour Mobility: Capturing Benefits for Local Businesses - 45 key informant interviews with businesses, business organizations, and industries in Fort St. John.
16. Information on changes in commodity prices (revenues, expenses, assets, liabilities, expenditures for BC and some data provided by region in BC) based on PriceWaterhouseCooper reports on the mining sector.

17. A collection of media stories on mining projects and mobile labour from local, provincial, and national newspapers compiled between 2012 and 2013. Stopping tracking issues in mining sector due to decline in commodity prices that resulted in the closures or temporary winding down of operations. Moved to explore opportunities with other industry partners (i.e., BC Hydro Site C and from communities (Mackenzie/Williams Lake to Fort St. John's).
18. Information on labour used on BC Hydro's Site C Project; Data includes the following: total # of Site C workers; # of BC workers at Site C; total # of construction and non-construction contractors / workers; # of BC construction and non-construction contractors / workers; total # of project management team; # of BC based project management team; # of temporary foreign workers; # of workers associated with international mobility program; and total # of Peace River Regional District workers. 19. Dataset from an anonymous household survey (33 respondents) of young workers in Banff (Angèle Smith).
20. Dataset from individual surveys of youth workers – Ambassador Workshop (27 respondents).
21. Dataset from 35 one-on-one interviews and 6 focus groups with youth workers.
22. A collection of media stories (2012-2020) from local, provincial, and national newspapers and social media throughout the project.
23. Photo essaying, initial introductory on-site interviews with Town of Banff officials and advocacy organizations, and initial demographic information data collection (Angèle Smith).

29. Secondary data documenting the history of and volume of fly-in/fly-out operations in Fort McMurray between 2004 and 2014, numbers of camps and migrant workers or shadow population in the Wood Buffalo Region (**Marcella Cassiano** and Sara Dorow).

Ontario Component

30. Dataset from 27 confidential interviews with precariously employed immigrant workers in Toronto (Stephanie Premji).
31. Labour force survey (2011-15) and Population Census 2016 created at the Research Data Center, Statistics Canada, McMaster University for **Waad Khogali Ali**. The LFS provides estimates of employment and unemployment across Canada's landscape whilst the Census provides an enumeration of Canada's population based on demographic and socioeconomic characteristics. Both surveys are cross-sectional in design and disaggregated across multiple spatial scales including; national, provincial, CMA, CA and urban-rural.

Quebec Component

32. Quebec researchers completed 38 life history interviews. These are being used as the basis for an online database using the Centre for Oral History and Digital Storytelling *Stories Matter* program.

Prince Edward Island Component

33. PEI field component completed 30 semi-structured interviews (20 interviews of individual truck drivers, 8 employers of drivers or company representatives, as well as 2 key informants) on ERGM in the PEI trucking Industry.

Nova Scotia Component

34. Dataset of 29 interviews conducted with foreign nurses employed in the healthcare sector in the province of Nova Scotia (**Shiva Nourpanah**).
35. Dataset from interviews and survey of professional and semi-professional health care workers in Nova Scotia (Michael Leiter, Lois Jackson, Ivy Bourgeault, Pauline Gardiner Barber, Audrey Krusseilbrink, and Sheri Price). 40 interviews and 156 survey responses.

39. Dataset from 39 anonymous surveys in Parker's Cove, NL and 12 anonymous surveys in New Waterford, NS (Kelly Vodden, **Heather Hall**, and Doug Lionais).

45. Rural Youth: key informant interviews with 5 CYN Executive Directors and 9 focus groups (N=72) with youth affiliated with the CYN in Placentia, St. Lawrence, Grand Bank, Harbour Grace, Clarenville, and St. John's.

 - i. Google Analytics demonstrates that the On the Move website overall has received 71,796 sessions and 164,956 page views from 56,381 new users.
 - ii. About 64% of users are based in Canada and about 14% are based in the US, but visitors also come from France, South Korea, the UK, India, Germany, China, and Australia, among others.
 - iii. As a smaller sample, from February 17, 2021–February 17, 2023, we received 12,064 sessions and 18,823 page views from 10,450 users mainly from Canada (59%) and the US (19%).

OTM Thematic Webpages

1. Alberta Stories shares the stories of work-related mobility from three different groups of people: Indigenous people (Métis in northeastern Alberta), Interprovincial/Interregional labour migrants (long-distance commuters to the Oil Sands region), and International labour migrants (temporary work permit holders in central and northern Alberta). Diverse experiences and impacts of E-RGM are found within and across the three sets of stories. At the same time, the stories collectively illuminate the importance of mobilities – and the immobilities that go with them – to the opening up and closing down of life opportunities for people. They show how mobility for work both shapes and is shaped by family situations, socio-historical identities, and communal places and networks. While ‘mobility for work’ mostly refers to paid employment, it also, importantly, includes unpaid labour such as care work or harvesting.
